




# 6. How long have you WORKED in Dunwoody?




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# 7. If you don't live or work in Dunwoody, are you familiar with the City?



- The problem is the traffic from the college. Its the college that's changed the way the community feels. If the college didn't grow the way it has, there wouldn't be the traffic problems.
- The residents are proud of the way our city looks.
- The residents seem to be very organized, involved, concerned, and supportive. That's a very positive image.
- The roads and traffic are deplorable.
- The roads are becoming terrible!
- The streets need paving....not just filling the pot holes so that they wear out again. Dekalb county has spent enough on spray paint to identify the hole to have paved somewhere....but never did anything but patch...and not much of that. This is basic and necessary maintenance. The rest of the improvements won't matter if the streets look so bad. My own neighborhood, near Austin school has never been paved in the 25 years I've been here and there's a growing pot hole (already down to mud) at the entrance to our cul-de-sac that extends almost halfway across the street.
- The traffic is an issue for many residents, we actually had a neighbor just move closer to Davis academy because they could not stand the traffic.
- The traffic is becoming a huge nightmare and the roads need to improve. I would like to see the parks expanded and even additional parks if possible. Other than that is it a great place to raise kids. We are worried about the huge percentage of multi unit living as opposed to single family units. My understanding is that we are currently at 60% apartments and 40% single family residences, since we have no control over our schools this drastically effects the numbers within our schools and the quality of education Dunwoodians have come to expect. It also has drastically effected the congestion and traffic on our roads.
- The traffic is terrible for such a small place right in front of the Publix. Build a giant overpass bridge over that publix area...
- The traffic on Dunwoody Club Drive is not congested but it borders on the dangerous. People are over 50 every day and some are well above 50 mph. The curve coming out of Dunwoody Country Club and the downhill straight way are an invitation to everyone with a lead foot. Try walking on the side walk on Dunwoody Club Drive and see how safe you feel.
- The traffic problems are primarily in the Roberts Road, Chamblee-Dunwoody to I-85 route both South and North bound. Most of these problems could be solved at little or no cost. The greatest problem is at Nandina Lane and Chamblee-Dunwoody Road. While there is a protected left turn light at Mount Vernon/Chamblee-Dunwoody intersection, many drivers do not want to wait and turn left off of Mt. Vernon into Nandina and then try to make unprotected left turns on to Chamblee-Dunwoody, often getting part way across and thus blocking two lanes of traffic. A simple solution would be to prohibit left turns off Mt. Vernon into Nandina and left turns from Nandina on to Chamblee Dunwoody(or prohibit such turns from say 7-9 am and 4-6 pm...The next trouble spot is Chamblee-Dunwoody at Vermack. At rush hours there is usually one car trying to turn from south bound Chamblee-Dunwoody on to vermack and due to very heavy on-coming traffic is unable to make the turn without waiting through several light changes thus backing up traffic sometimes back North for many blocks. The solution would be to put at least one space for a left turn lane. It appears that there is adequate right-of-way at this intersection to accomplish this simple solution...The third major traffic flow issue is similar to the first one identified above...While there is a protected left turn traffic light on the upper end of the Publix shopping plaza, numerous shoppers attempt to make an unprotected exit from the lower Publix exit which causes potential accidents and stops smooth traffic flow..The solution is to exclude left turns from this exit...The final one I will comment on is the triangle at Chamblee-Dunwoody/ Roberts Road intersection...I have seen accidents and almost accidents at this intersection because drivers tend to ignore the yield sign and/or mis-judge either the speed of on-coming traffic or cut off on-coming traffic...the solution would be one of the following 1) change the yield sign to a stop sign 2) more enforcement of the yield provisions 3) remove the triangle altogether requiring all traffic to be subject to the traffic signal. While we can do little to slow amount of cut through traffic from GA 400(which is increasing each month due to expansions north of Dunwoody)we can do things with just a little thought to greatly enhance the traffic flow.

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- the worst part about Dunwoody is the college. Spend my taxes fighting the college, not widening our roads and intersections and ruining our neighborhoods for the bad crowd from the other closed campuses. I didn't build and invest here for them.
- There are so many opportunities to honor Dunwoody's history while creating an inviting environment more suitable for today's lifestyles. These could include energy efficient buildings and homes, bike lanes, community gardens, safe routes to school.
- There is an historic, civil war era cemetery, unknown to the Dunwoody Preservation Trust literature. Why not known? It is near the corner of Happy Hollow and Dunwoody Club Dr.


## 17. Is there anything additional you would like to tell us about Dunwoody? (continued)

A major task of this effort is to get Perimeter Center to become a part of the city. They have been divorced for years ever since Perimeter Center's inception, which is a problem because the economic center of Dunwoody is Perimeter Center.
- Perimeter Center (PC) is multi-jurisdictional so it hasn't be associated as part of Dunwoody and there are no boundary lines between Sandy Springs, Perimeter Center and Dunwoody. Perimeter Center is part of Dunwoody, Dekalb and Sandy Springs. PCID has made Perimeter Center feel like it's a part of both Dunwoody and Sandy Springs, so it has remained as its own identity.
- PC has to be careful to not give preference between Dunwoody vs. Sandy Springs. We don't want there to be many looks, we have done a lot to make the decorative elements of PC what they are. We want to make the look seamless.
- A lot of companies will consider using Atlanta as the mailing address because people don't know where Dunwoody is, and even companies won't know where they fall on the Dunwoody / Sandy Springs property lines.
- From a signage standpoint, how can we marry the places that have existing PCID logos with the city of Dunwoody overlapping areas?
- People don't understand where Dunwoody stops. The citizens of Dunwoody don't even know where the city begins and ends.

## Areas in Dunwoody:

- Initially, we purposefully made the Dunwoody Village look different from the Perimeter Center so that Perimeter wouldn't invade Dunwoody. But, maybe it is time to start changing the way that the two work together so that we are one Dunwoody.
- Georgetown Area, Dunwoody Village area, Perimeter Center area are the three large commercial points in the city of Dunwoody.
- The areas of Dunwoody are aligned with the school lines more than anything. We don't have any specific residential areas. Most people don't feel that there are defined areas.

### Why do people move here?

- Schools People choose where they want to live based on the school system.
- Living Younger people will move here for the convenience of the apartment complexes that are affordable, but it's also very expensive to buy. A lot of people will move for convenience. The school districts are well known. There is a perception issue for the housing market in Dunwoody there is a vibrant market that is more affordable than northern Atlanta but is comparable to Sandy Springs or Marietta.
- Very few homes that are on the market that are fully renovated there is a trend right now of people holding onto their homes because it is bad to sell, so there have been a lot less of home renovations. There is a perception that Dunwoody is a premier residential community. Dunwoody is upscale, elegant, and classy but we also want to attract people who would want to be in Dunwoody for a long time, and establish themselves. There is almost no opportunity for new housing in Dunwoody though so people are now just staying in Dunwoody because no one can move.
- MARTA Proximity of Dunwoody between 285 and 400 makes it easy to get to the city Atlanta but MARTA is not a draw for people whom a permanent residents in Dunwoody. MARTA however is important for Perimeter Center and MARTA is a great tool to use, although it is under utilized. MARTA does bring a lot of employees to the mall it's critical to the overall community, but the residents won't use it.
- Safety perception that crime is lower outside of the perimeter. There is a perception of the perfect lifestyle in Dunwoody with the white picket fence and the 2.5 kids.
- Sandy Springs' tagline is "living it upscale" which is such a turnoff. Plus the apartments in Sandy Springs are a lot more run down than Dunwoody.

## People of Dunwoody:

- We're back to the small town atmosphere as a function of the city and the people. The people are very involved in their own government and their own destiny. A lot of people are small town people. We get a little hung up on the farmhouse, but we don't want it to be a driving point. You want to say we have small town morals, traits, but there is a future that you can develop. We have heritage but we are looking to the future.
- When people move to Dunwoody they tend to stay in Dunwoody. There are a lot of people who have stayed in Dunwoody more than five years. People like to say that they are from Dunwoody there is an element of civic pride.

### Is there a difference between the people who work here and the people who live here?

- There are a lot of people who just get off the highway and go to work or go to the perimeter but who will never see the city itself. The recent development of Perimeter Center community housing (live-work-play) is going to start to erase the dichotomy of people who are either residents or employees so that people are both.
- We want to involve the 100,000 people who commute as much as the 45,000 who are permanent residents.
- PC is focused on the visitors, and residential Dunwoody is focused on the community and the family.
- Branding / Development create a uniqueness in the Dunwoody area that separates Dunwoody from its neighbors
- There is a transient minority population in the city.

### What do you think people who live here would say?

- There are a lot of older people in their homeowners association who won't move forward with any of the younger new ideas.
- People will always resist something if it's different.
- Our community was populated during the 70s and 80s our kids have grown up and moved, but we are still here. We are gradually needing to change and starting to transition, which is now evident in the elementary school system our schools are at 143% capacity.
- A lot of people who live in this community are starting to get younger with young kids.
- There is still a resistance to change in Dunwoody despite the younger community. There some legitimacy in the stable residents who don't want to change people want it to stay the way it is. People are very protective of their own ideas.
- There are residential communities in Dunwoody where you have to drive to get to the grocery store because of the way the neighborhoods are set up. This is not what younger generation wants anymore.
- We're not making anything up about our community if people aren't going to move here to do business, then they won't. We won't lie about who we are.

- We would come here to go shopping Perimeter is a lot nicer than Gwinnett place it's more convenient. We used to think of it as the Chamblee–Dunwoody area.
- Safe sophisticated sense of community.

- PC is a Dynamic corporate environment but Dunwoody isn't considered that significant as a place. Instead of luxury we consider Dunwoody as Upper Upscale.
- Boring, stale, deteriorating.
